

A CHRISTMAS STORY OF THE POINSETTIA

It just happened... being asked to deliver some beautiful artificial poinsettias to some friends. One happened to be Robert Thonhoff, our Historian of the Granaderos y Damas de Gálvez. I keep up with Robert and Vicie Thonhoff often by phone.

Robert asked me one evening, "Do you know the story behind the poinsettia." As usual, I answered "No" and he proceeded to tell me. Well, that started another story, one I find interesting. First, the scientific name for the poinsettia is Euphorbia, pulcherrima, (meaning very beautiful). It was identified as a new species in 1834 by German botanist Johann Friedrich Klotzsch, who credits Carl Ludwig Willdenow with the species name. Indigenous to Central America, the plant flourished in an area of Southern Mexico known as Taxco del Alarcon. The Aztecs called the plant Cuetlaxochitland and used the plant in a variety ways; as dye, cosmetics, and to treat fevers. Montezuma, the last Aztec king had the plants brought into Mexico City by caravans since it would not grow in high attitudes. Poinsettias are shrubs or small trees, with heights of 2 to 13 feet and became associated with the Christmas holiday and are popular seasonal decorations.



If not for the efforts of Joel Roberts Poinsett, the poinsettia may have remained unknown and unappreciated as a regional plant. Joel Poinsett was the son of a French physician and appointed as the first United States Ambassador to Mexico (1825-1829) by President Madison and later became a co-founder of the Smithsonian Institution. While visiting the Taxco area in 1828 he became enchanted with the brilliant red blooms of the poinsettia plant. He sent some back to his greenhouses in Greenville South Carolina where he began to propagate the plants and send them to his friends. A nurseryman in Pennsylvania, Robert Buist, is thought to

be the first to market and sell the plants in the United States.

In Mexico, the plant is known as *flor de Nochebuena*, meaning, the Christmas Eve flower. Since the 17th century, Franciscan friars have used the poinsettia in Christmas celebrations with the star-shaped leaves representing the Star of Bethlehem and the red color representing the blood sacrifice of Jesus's crucifixion.

In the US, December 12 is National Poinsettia Day, marking the anniversary of Joel Robert Poinsett's death.

The Sign

One of the most recognized symbols in the world, the \$ sign, has been around over two hundred years, yet few Americans know how it originated and evolved.

The dollar symbol originated during the American Revolution when the Continental Congress, in the midst of all its other problems, was struggling to adopt a currency. In 1775 the Continental Congress, on a proposal by Thomas Jefferson, rejected the British Sterling and adopted the "Spanish Milled Dollar" as its basic monetary unit.

Oliver Pollock, the New Orleans merchant who acted as an intermediary between the American government and General Bernardo de Gálvez, is credited with originating the symbol. Through his efforts, great amounts of money, arms, ammunition, and military supplies were acquired from Spain and funneled into the American colonies.

The "**S**" alludes to Spain and the two vertical marks "||" allude to the Pillars of Hercules. Shown below is a "Spanish milled dollar," or *peso*, that was minted in Mexico City in 1781, the year that the Spanish and French forces commanded by General Bernardo de Gálvez fought and won the Battle of Pensacola. On the obverse, or front side, is an image of King Carlos III. On the reverse is the image of the royal coat of arms flanked by the Pillars of Hercules, which adorned most Spanish coins of the period.

The origin and significance of the dollar (\$) sign is yet another part of our wonderful Spanish heritage in America that has somehow been lost, forgotten, or obscured.

Revolutionary War Battlefield found in South Carolina

In a recent report in the Charleston, South Carolina newspaper, <u>The Post and Courier</u>, archaeologist Mike Yianoponous of the South Carolina Battleground and Preservation Trust and his colleagues have found the site of the Battle of Tar Bluff. This battle was fought in August of 1782.

This battle is known today that John Laurens, an aide-decamp to George Washington and a friend of Alexander Hamilton and the Marquis de Lafayette was killed.

The battlefield is located on private property and is one of 72 that has been identified by the Trust.

Completed is a new resource for searching the names of more than one thousand men who aided in the Spanish Illinois region during the American Revolution.

Only about fifteen today are proven patriots.

The three of us began a discussion in 2014 to launch a project to transcribe all the known militia lists for St. Louis and St. Geneviève from 1779 to 1783.

We had slowly begun the project; however, it wasn't until mid-March when the three of us committed to weekly Zoom calls to get it done! Twenty-four weeks later the book is up on Amazon.

By mid-June we had a good draft and were ready to ask Ivette Ron Chapman from Speedy Printing in Houston to help with the page formatting and to prepare the manuscript for uploading to Kindle Direct Publishing. Ivette suggested Lucas Perez to design the cover artwork and Kristine's daughter Sara Arribas Sjostrom contributed the Frontispiece.

The attached trailer for a documentary about the Battle of St. Louis features Kristine. Both Kristine and Molly live in Spain and are members of the Espana DAR Chapter. Anthony lives in Houston and is a member the Lady Washington Chapter.

We have so enjoyed this project and can hardly wait to collaborate again!

This video was created by our Veteran's Committee Chair, Bob Denny.






Pierre George Rousseau Chapter News

207TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BATTLE OF MEDINA, "THE GETTYSBURG OF TEXAS" August 18, 2020

On this day, August 18th, in the year 1813, two hundred and seven years ago, in a matter of just a few hours, Texas lost over one-half of its adult male population and about one-third of its total population in the disastrous Battle of Medina, a veritable "Gettysburg of Texas."

The fateful Battle of Medina was a Texas counterpart of the Mexican Revolution against Spain, which started with "El Grito de Dolores" by Padre Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla on September 16, 1810, and quietly ended on August 24, 1821.

Fought on August 18, 1813, somewhere in a sandy oak forest region of southern Bexar County and northern Atascosa County, the Battle of Medina was the deadliest, bloodiest battle ever fought on Texas soil.

Occurring during a very confused and turbulent period of world history, the disastrous Battle of Medina affected the destinies of five nations of the world: Spain, Mexico, the United States of America, France, and England. Mexico and much of Latin America were in revolt against Spain, whose king from 1807 till 1814 was Joseph Bonaparte, the brother of Napoleon, who was on a rampage in Europe, and the United States of America was at war with England, later to be called the War of 1812.

In this cauldron of world events, Bernardo Gutiérrez de Lara, a visionary rancher and merchant of Revilla, Nuevo Santander, and Augustus Magee, a former West Point graduate, aided and abetted by the United States, organized an expedition to wrest the Province of Texas

from Spain. Flying the Green Flag, their Republican Army of the North crossed from the Neutral Ground in Louisiana into Texas on August 7. 1812, and soon captured Nacogdoches and Trinidad de Salcedo before heading toward and capturing Presidio La Bahía, where during the winter of 1812-1813, Spanish Royalist forces under Texas Governor Manuel de Salcedo and Nuevo León Governor Simón de Herrera besieged the Republicans for nearly four months, one of the longest sieges—if not the longest-in American military history. Royalists lifted the siege, and the Republicans marched toward San Antonio and defeated the Spanish Royalists on March 29, 1813, in the Battle of Rosillo. The Republicans took control of San Antonio on April 1, 1813, and on April 4, 1813, two Spanish governors, Manuel de Salcedo and Simón de Herrera, were brutally executed. On April 6 a Declaration of Independence established the first republican government of the State of Texas, with a President-Protector, a Junta (council), and a Constitution. After the victorious Battle of Alazán on the outskirts of Béxar on June 20, 1813, the Republicans reigned supreme in Texas.

With one bold stroke, however, Spain struck back. On August 18, 1813, the 1830-member Spanish Royalist Army under General Joaquín de Arredondo decimated the 1400-member Republican Army of the North under the command of General José Álvarez de Toledo in "*la batalla del encinal de Medina*." Less than one hundred of the Republicans are known to have escaped.

The Republican Army of the North was composed of about 200-300 *Norteamericanos*, 800-900 *Tejanos*, 100-200 Native Americans, and one Black named "Thomas."

More lives were lost in the Battle of Medina than were lost in the battles at the Alamo, Goliad, and San Jacinto combined some 23 years later in the Second Texas Revolution of 1835-1836.

in Texas during August 1813 and the weeks and months and years thereafter were indescribably cataclysmic. The total population of Texas in the year 1809, counting men, women, and children was reported to be 3,122. A mathematical analysis reveals that about one-third of the total population of Texas and over one-half of the adult male population of Texas was lost in the fateful Battle of Medina and its vengeful aftermath.

So far, six of the Republicans are known to have been veterans of the American Revolution, some were sons of American Revolutionaries, some were later participants in the War of 1812, and some were participants of the Second Texas Revolution of 1835-1836. The bones of about 800 Republicans killed in the Battle of Medina were left to bleach on the sand for nine years before they were gathered in 1822 and buried under an oak tree somewhere in the "encinal."

Once found and archaeologically confirmed, the Medina battle site, the oak tree burial site of some 800 Republican warriors, and the burial site of 55 Royalist soldiers killed in the battle would be worthy of designation as National Historical Sites.


